- 3. To whom is the poet speaking in this first book? Why?

- 4. Identify the epic simile in lines 9-12. What does this comparison tell you about Hermes?
- 5. What is Zeus' command to Calypso?
- 6. Which god or goddess brings Zeus' command to Calypso?
- 7. What is the purpose of lines 17-31? How is it achieved?
- 8. What is Odysseus' struggle in lines 47-54?
- 9. Reread lines 43-54. Which of Odysseus' qualities is emphasized here?
- 10. Reread Odysseus' answer to Calypso in lines 81-86. Why do you think he is referred to inline 80 as "the strategist Odysseus"? Explain
- 11. Reread lines 87-92. Explain what two things are being compared in this epic simile. Why does it work here?

Book 9

- 12. Which encounter does Odysseus and his men have before the Lotus Eaters?
- 13. Why is it necessary for Odysseus to take some of his men by force away from the land of the Lotus-Eaters?
- 14. Reread lines 24-26. What does Odysseus value most highly? How is this an epic hero quality?
- 15. Why doesn't Odysseus respect the Cyclopes? (lines 58-67)
- 16. What does Odysseus' metaphor in lines 90-91 imply about the cyclops?
- 17. How is Odysseus able to wound Polyphemus?
- 18. How is the craftiness and cunning of Odysseus revealed in this escape?
- 19. Why does Odysseus reveal his name to Polyphemus after he has escaped?
- 20. Why does Oydsseus refuse his men's "sound" request in lines 130-132?
- 21. Reread lines 163-169. Agamemnon was the Greek king who led the war against the Trojans. Consider what Odysseus says about Agamemnon; what point is he making about himself by claiming this association?
- 22. What epithet is repeated in lines 211-212? What purpose does it serve?
- 23. Odysseus tells the cyclops his name is "Nohbdy." What trait does this reveal? Explain.
- 24. Find the epic similes in lines 292-297 and 299-303. What two things are being compared in each case? What are the effects of the figurative language?
- 25. What epic hero traits does Odysseus demonstrate in his dealings with Polyphemus?
- 26. Reread lines 437-452. Paraphrase these lines. Then tell how Odysseus has brought this curse on himself.

- 27. What natural phenomenon is controlled by Aeolus?
- 28. How does Aeolus show his goodwill when Odysseus is about to leave?
- 29. Odysseus and his men come within sight of Ithaca. Why do they not land?
- 30. Odysseus asks for further help from Aeolus. What is his reply? Why?
- 31. Describe the Laestrygonians.
- 32. In lines 6-11, explain the simile involving Circe's wolves and mountain lions. To what are they being compared? Why?
- 33. What happens to Odysseus' men after they drink Circe's potion?

- 47. Do the choices Odysseus makes in this book make him more of a hero or a villain?
- 48. Look at lines 193-199. Explain the epic simile. What two things are being compared? What is the effect on the reader?
- 49. Copy lines 76-82. Paraphrase carefully by rewriting these lines in YOUR own words. You may want to set this up as a side-by side format.

- 83. What is Penelope compared to in lines 81-90?
